

SPECIAL UPDATE CHANGES TO HOW YOU VOTE

DON'T LOSE YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE

- Voter identification now required at polling stations
- You must now have approved ID when voting in person
- No valid ID? Then you must apply for a voter card or take out a postal vote

New laws forced through by the Tory government and opposed by the Green Party mean big changes in how people vote. Starting at the local elections on 4th May - when all three of your ward councillors will be up for election - anyone voting at a polling station will need to bring a valid form of photo identification. **You will not be able to vote without a valid ID**. Postal voters are not affected yet. New rules around postal voting are expected to come into force later this year after the local elections.

Valid forms of ID for voting in person include:

- Passport (UK, European Economic Area or Commonwealth). Expired documents will be accepted providing that the photograph is still a good likeness.
- Driving Licence full or provisional.
- Concessionary travel passes including an older person or disabled person's bus pass (but not a
 young person's pass). Disabled persons Blue Badge. Proof of Age Standards Scheme (PASS) card.

If you do not have an accepted form of ID you can apply for a Voter Authority Certificate – this is a photographic identity document specifically for voting. There is no charge for this. Alternatively you can apply to vote by post by completing the relevant form and returning it to the Town Hall.

AN ATTACK ON DEMOCRACY

Voter fraud is virtually non-existent. Polls show public confidence in elections is very high and convictions are extremely rare. So why is the government making these changes?

The Green Party believes these changes are politically motivated. People from poorer or ethnic minority backgrounds who tend not to vote Conservative are much less likely to have valid ID compared with people from well off areas. Moreover, the government's own figures suggest these changes could cost £180 million over the next decade.

Not only is this a blatant attempt to prevent poor and vulnerable people from voting, it is also a complete waste of time and money during a cost of living crisis."
